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man left an indelible impression on her.

"Cal Holman was a great example of someone who acted on his beliefs rather than just talking about them," she said. "He contributed so much to this community and the Republican Party. He will be missed by so many people."

The Maricopa County Republican Committee Executive Guidance Committee also expressed sympathy and praise to the longtime, dedicated Republican and his family. Mr. Holman also served as chairman for the former Legislative District 34, both before and after he served as a legislator. He was a Harvard graduate with a MBA from Stan-

ford, according to a committee press release.

"Holman's many years of service to the Republican Party will long be remembered," said MCRP Chairman Lyle Tuttle in the press release.

Legislative District 8-Chairman Kyrre Floss, who represents the area where the Holmans resided, said the former legislator was one of hardest-working and most dedicated Republicans he has ever known, noting his loss is felt by all who knew him.

Mr. Holman, who usually wore shorts and a Van Gogh tie with a clipboard and voter registration forms in hand, holds the record for registering the most Republicans to vote in various elections. One year he personally signed up about 100 precinct committeemen, according to Mr. Floss.

Former state Sen. Pete Corp-

stein, who served in the Arizona House in the 1970s and 1980s with Mr. Holman and former Supreme Court Justice Sandra Day O'Connor, said the former legislator was one of the most dedicated Republicans he has ever known.

"There was no loafing on the job with him," said Mr. Corpstein in the press release. "He was a district chairman before and after he served in the legislature. He was a great organizer and did a wonderful job as a district chairman."

Freely Taylor, a reporter/editor who covered the Northwest Valley for more than two decades, also commended the work of Mr. Holman and his fellow constituents.

"The trio of Holman, Corpstein and O'Connor helped the struggling Paradise Valley/North Scottsdale area through a multi-tude of rapid growth/political

problems in the 70s and 80s," said Mr. Taylor in the press release. "They were familiar faces at numerous community meetings, chamber banquets and political events. Cal was dedicated to the betterment of the district he represented. He will be missed."

Memorial services were held Jan. 3 at the Valley Presbyterian Church, 8047 E. McDonald Drive, Paradise Valley.
